Credit Options:

The course will be offered for 50 clock hours, based on the length and substance of the book. The course will include 50 multiple-choice questions and two required essays.

Grading Rubric:

◆ Pass/Fail: Coursework must be passed with 70% criterion.



Two Essays Required

Choose two of the following options:

Option 1: Identify and describe specific techniques from the text that you currently use or will use in your classroom setting to encourage active reading and writing. Show how you will measure success and effectively address failures.

Option 2: Look at Common Core Connections on p. 117 in the text. Try "Doing the Book" with a small group of students. Describe the approach you used, how the story was selected and the results you noticed from the activity.

Option 3: At the end of each chapter, there is a gray box with questions to help you reflect on the chapter topic as it is practiced in your classroom. Choose a chapter topic that interests you and use the questions at the end of the chapter to frame your essay.

Option 4: The text provides activities throughout the text to use in the classroom. Try several and in your essay, talk about what you tried and why you selected it, which students participated and how the lessons were received by your students. Will you use them again?

Option 5: Create your own demonstration of the learning you take from this text. Identify your topic and describe it in an introductory paragraph. You may choose from the list below or develop your own.

Compare/contrast your current education practice to that of the text Create forms or systems for use in your classroom including assessment tools

The essay must demonstrate knowledge of the course and text, and direct application to your own educational position.

Essay scoring rubric:

Two essays required One essay, three to five pages One essay, two to three pages Single spaced, 10 to 12 size font

Use of introduction and summary statement (even when a unit is developed) Demonstration of grammar, spelling and writing skill Demonstration of applied knowledge

All essays must be fully completed and the rubric followed to receive a grade. Essays not completed to required length will not be processed and revisions will be required.
